Dear Parents and Members of the Utica School District Community,



It is that time of the year again when we publish our Utica City School District Calendar. I am very proud to announce that last year's calendar, *Little Hand's Big Hearts* was awarded a first place Award of Excellence at the National School Public Relations Association's (NSPRA) 2015 Publications and Electronic Media Contest. As a result, our calendar was put on display in the Public Exchange Center at the NSPRA National Seminar in Nashville, Tennessee, this past July. This is a tremendous honor and I would like to thank and congratulate Dr. Angela Elefante, Administrator for Library and Instructional Media, her staff and the Oneida-Herkimer-Madison BOCES School Communications department.

The theme of the 2015-2016 Utica City School District Calendar is appropriately titled *Building Our Future*. This theme has been prominently displayed across our school district over the past several years during our extensive \$187 million capital project. As this project has progressed, we have seen every one of our schools updated and brought into the 21st century. As a district, we are also very proud of the fact that the project continues to be on time and under budget. This is a credit to the meticulous planning and strict oversight on the part of the district.

Early on in the project, we celebrated the re-opening of Conkling Elementary School which helped to reduce overcrowding in several of our elementary schools. In March of 2013, I had the honor of overseeing the grand opening of the newly renovated and beautifully restored auditorium at Thomas R. Proctor High School. This was followed by bringing two new cafeterias online at the high school along with a third gymnasium to better serve our growing population of students. As a result of the project, we have also seen classrooms in every building updated in order to greatly enhance teaching and learning. This has included upgrading the instructional technology in every classroom so that our teachers and students have the newest tools available to meet their educational needs.

Over the next couple of years, the renovations at each building will be completed and the project will conclude with the modernization of the facility at Kernan Elementary School. This will be achieved by replacing the outdated 1916 wing with a three-story addition and by renovating the 1954 building. The Kernan School Project is also important because it will provide the district with a place to permanently relocate our administrative offices. In doing so, we will significantly reduce yearly operational costs and provide long-term savings to the district by eliminating the need to rent or lease office space. In addition, the renovations at Kernan will help to beautify the neighborhood that the school has proudly served for so many years.

As a district, we are proud of the work that has been done in each and every one of our schools. The renovations have played an important role in enhancing our instructional programs district wide and have helped to provide the space and the resources necessary to implement 21st century teaching and learning in every classroom. This is directly in line with the district's primary goal of promoting student achievement.

On behalf of all of our administration, faculty and staff, I encourage our parents, families and the community to take part in the wide array of activities that are happening in each school and to see and enjoy the work that has been done!







Universal Pre-Kindergarten (UPK)

The Universal Pre-kindergarten Program is free for children who will be four years old by December 1, 2015, and are residents of the Utica City School District. The program provides children with 2 ½ hours of instruction, five days per week for the entire school year. There are no fees for eligible children to participate in Universal Pre-kindergarten.

All UPK classes are offered in partnership with the following community agencies in Utica: First Nursery, Head Start, Neighborhood Center, New Discoveries Learning Center, North Utica Community Center, Notre Dame Elementary, and the Thea Bowman House. Parents may choose to send their children to any of these agencies for pre-kindergarten.

Utica UPK focuses on preparing children for kindergarten through a developmentally appropriate, culturally responsive program. Certified Pre-K teachers focus on building students' fundamental language and literacy skills. Children learn letters, sounds, sight words, counting shapes, vocabulary, and science concepts while developing social, emotional, and physical skills through hands-on activities and learning centers. Parent involvement is encouraged through many unique events offered by each center.

Technology

Mission, Vision & Goals

We envision an environment in which the adoption and use of 21st Century technologies will serve as tools to fulfill the instructional administrative communications and operations functions necessary to achieve the mission of the Utica City School District. Technology will be an essential tool to: create a diverse enriched learning experience for all students, enable students to flourish in an increasingly complex society, nurture and enhance the natural talents of our children, and enable all students to become lifelong learners.

Media Communications

A primary goal of the media department is to acquire diversified print and non-print materials that support instruction for the varied ethnic groups of students attending Utica schools. The school librarian collaborates with these students and staff to allocate and use resources that will meet their needs. The library staff's mission is to promote and reinforce students' interest and abilities in reading, listening, and viewing. The media department staff helps students use information competently in developing critical thinking skills, decision making, and problem solving.

The Utica City School District continues its partnership with Time Warner Entertainment Advance/Newhouse Partnership to produce and promote quality educational television programming on Channel 3. Channel 3 highlights teachers, students, and school programs, and all student events throughout the school district.

This year's programming highlighted the Utica Board of Education Meetings, the Utica Zoo, Community Reads Day, pre-school, early childhood conferences and workshops, drama productions and concerts for each school, and many other special events.

The Annenberg Foundation and Mellon Art Gallery renewed their licensing agreements with the district. Channel 3 will continue broadcasting all educational programs sponsored by these foundations over the dedicated channel throughout the year.

School Lunch Program

The UCSD Food Service Department shall be the foremost provider to students and other customers, of nutritionally-complete, low cost, tasty meals.

In partnership with the district and the school community, the Food Service Department resolves to meet the nutritional and health needs of the students through the provision of both healthy meals and nutritional education.

The district has once again been approved for the Community Eligibility Option (CEO). This means that every student may receive free breakfast and free lunch.

Health Information

In accordance with New York State Public Health Law (sec. 2164) and the New York State Education Law (sec. 901), the Utica City School District requires the immunizations listed to protect students from communicable diseases and to promote the health and welfare of the student body in general. New York State Law (Chapter 281) permits schools to request a dental examination in the following grades: school entry, K, 2, 4, 7, and 10.

Requirements for School Attendance

Under New York State Public Health Law (Section 2164), all children entering and attending school must be immunized against measles, mumps, rubella, diphtheria, polio, hepatitis B and chickenpox (varicella).

Children enrolled in pre-kindergarten are required to have one dose of HIB vaccine in addition to the requirements on the right. No principal, teacher, owner, or person in charge of a school shall permit a child to be admitted to school without the Immunization Certificate. The exemptions stated in the law are:

- (1) certification from a physician in New York state that one or more of the required immunizations may be detrimental. – or –
- (2) a written statement from the parent/guardian of the child that such person is a bona fide member of a specified religious organization whose teachings are contrary to immunization. The principal or person in charge of the school may require supporting documents from the religious organization specified.

Student Physicals

New York State Education Law (Section 903) requires that each new entrant to the district and students in pre-K, kindergarten, second, fourth, seventh, and tenth grades must have a physical examination either by the school physician or the family physician. A physical examination form must be completed by the family physician and submitted to the school nurse. Vision, hearing, and scoliosis screening will be performed by the school nurse.

Annual Asbestos Notification

In accordance with the Asbestos Hazard Emergency Response Act of 1987 (AHERA), a copy of the Utica City School District's building inspection report and management plan is available for review during business hours by appointment. Please contact the Maintenance Foreman Mike Ferraro at 792.2231 if you need to set up an appointment or if you have any questions.

Pesticide Notification Procedure

The Utica City School District, following its adoption of a pest-management policy at its special Board of Education meeting on September 11, 2001, uses current integrated pest management practices to reduce the use of pesticides in our buildings and on our grounds.

It may be necessary, however, to use pesticides periodically during the year. New York state law requires that schools and BOCES maintain a list of parents or guardians, as well as staff, who wish to receive written notice forty-eight (48) hours prior to a pesticide application at their facility.

If you wish to be included on the School District Notification List or for further information on the District Pesticide Program, please contact Mike Ferraro at 792.2231. You will receive advance notification of an application at your child's facility of a pesticide product covered by the notification requirements, except in the event of an emergency application in response to a threat to public health.

Medication During the School Day

STUDENTS MAY NOT CARRY MEDICATION WITH THEM

School policies regarding administration of medication are consistent with procedures established by State Education Law.

For students to receive medication (prescription or nonprescription, including cough drops and other "over-the-counter" drugs) during the school day, the following procedures MUST be followed and renewed each year:

The parent or legal guardian must submit a written request to the school authorities together with a written request from the prescribing physician indicating the frequency and dosage.

The medication must be brought to the school by a responsible adult in the original container labeled with the name of the drug and the dosage. Unless these procedures are followed, medications will NOT be administered in school.
